Inside the Museum Files:

Placerville



(Information taken from the walking tour pamphlet of Old Town Placerville)

The Elk Grove Historical Society scheduled a bus trip to tour Placerville and its museums. The town is loaded with tons of history and EVERY building has a story.

Placerville, also known as Dry Diggings or Hangtown, is just eight miles from Coloma where gold was discovered January 24, 1848 by James Marshall. At first only a mining camp in the narrow ravine with a seasonal creek, it quickly became a prosperous town, which thrived as a business shifted from mining to agriculture and logging. The name Hangtown was first used in 1849 when three men were hanged after a speedy trial. The men, originally six, robbed a stage to use the money to finance and establish the confederacy in California. The name Placerville became official when the Post Office was established in 1854. Two years later, Placerville was devastated by three separate fires, which destroyed most of the timber shacks and tents which sprung up in 1848. They rebuilt with bricks.

541 Main Street – In 1853 blacksmith Hugh L. Hinds fired John M. Studebaker, who had come to California to find gold. Studebaker quickly discovered that he could make more money constructing and selling wheelbarrows to the miners. Each would hold three sacks instead of the miners carrying one at a time. He returned to South Bend, Indiana in 1858 with his fortune and invested in the family wagon business, which later became the Studebaker Automobile Company. John returned to Placerville for a visit in 1912 when he was honored by the entire town.

441 Main Street – Placerville Hardware is the oldest continuously operating hardware store west of the Mississippi. Go in and enjoy the atmosphere with its wooden floors, original bins, rolling ladders, and stock piled high. You can get practically anything here. (Think Newbert's in Sacramento) Years ago the newspaper was located in the east side of the building. The presses were operated with a Pelton Water wheel in Hangtown Creek. Just examples of two of the historic buildings.





Rhoads School Report

For several years the windows in the school have leaked. We have constantly pursued the repair and/or replacement and finally have been given permission by CSD to repair them. The work was slated from January 23 to February 1, but was cancelled because of extreme weather. Classes are now in full swing almost every day until summer. They are now slated for repair/replacement the first week of June.

In the Stage Stop Museum, upstairs in the ballroom, we have an Elk Grove area school display of all 40 schools (with photos) in the district just before the unification in 1959. Rhoads School is highlighted with a mock classroom and artifacts. This is an opportunity to see how the Elk Grove school system began.

It will be available for a whole year.


