

Treasures from Our Past

VanHyning Lamp By Judy Carter Semas

From VanHyning Family - about 1878. "Given to Crawford Carter, son, by his mother Beth"

This is what remains today written on two pieces of tape on the bottom of this beautiful

This is what remains today written on two pieces of tape on the bottom of this beautiful Kerosene lamp. It was written by my Grandfather, George VanHyning Carter (1882-1969), who received it from his mother, Margaret Ann VanHyning (1857-1929). It was passed down to my father, Crawford Frances Carter (1912-1979) and upon my father's passing given to me. My grandfather converted the lamp to electricity. He was a very crafty handyman and I can remember spending many hours in his workshop in the basement of his home on Ordway Street in

Berkeley. The lamp is sitting on one of the many tables he made. He worked over 30 years for DeMartini Candy and Soda Supply Company as their bookkeeper in San Francisco. The table was made from wooden crates that were used to ship the candy and soda supplies to DeMartini's. My grandfather would magically transform the crates into beautiful tables, cabinets, doll furniture and more in his workshop. I am very grateful to have many of his crafted pieces in my home. But the greatest gift of all, is his handwritten notes attached to the items telling us of the history, and who would receive the item upon his, and my grandmother Beth's passing.

Stockton Road was the vital link between residents, ranchers and farmers and the big city of Sacramento. A rutted dirt road, wide enough for one wagon, wound through the groves of Valley and Scrub Oak, through washes and dry open land. Tule Elk, Antelope, Canada Geese, rabbits, fox, wolves, coyotes, Salmon and birds of all kinds were plentiful. The following was written by George Yount, who passed through the area circa 1837.

According to Yount (1923:52), deer, elk and antelope:

"...were numerous beyond parallel. In herds of many hundreds, they might be met so tame that they would hardly move to open the way for the traveler to pass. They were seen lying or grazing in great herds, on the sunny side of every hill and their young, like lambs, were frolicking in all directions. The wild geese and every species of water fowl darkened the surface of every bay and firth, and upon the land in flocks of millions, they wandered in quest of insects and cropping the wild oats which grew there in abundance. When disturbed, they arose to fly, the sound of their wings was like that of distant thunder. The rivers were literally crowded with salmon..."

Oak groves were so large that they were harvested as timber and the land was almost for the taking in that you

could acquire an acre for \$2.

Life wasn't easy by today's standards, and more than likely area residents would have owned or worked on large ranches or farms either taking care of cattle or tilling and harvesting the land. The only relief from summer heat was working in the mornings then sitting under a good shade tree or taking a trip to the Cosumnes River for a swim. The town of Elk Grove was a very small centralized group of buildings for supplies and services but was not, by any means, a residential area. Elk Grove was the name of the Post Office but not necessarily the name of the community. In 1866, George Foulks listed himself as from Buckner's, the hotel at the crossroads of Upper Stockton Road and Elk Grove-Franklin Road (now called Elk Grove Blvd and Highway 99), even though the Post office had been called Elk Grove for nine years.

Even after the Railroad was built in 1868, it took eight more years (1876) for the first commercial building to be erected in the new Elk Grove. This first building was the General Store along the Railroad tracks; it was operated by Chittenden and Everson. Out of these beginnings, Elk Grove began to grow but remained mostly a ranching and farming community. Even as late as 1922, George Foulks mentioned to his wife Bess that he didn't know what was happening to this area when he saw the new sign erected "Population 400".

As the new Elk Grove became the hub of life, old Elk Grove at the crossroads, on Upper Stockton Road remained a stop over for travelers and the area locals for gas, "refreshing drinks" and rumored games for many years. In 1957 the expanded Highway 99 was built which essentially ended old, old Elk Grove.

From that rutted wagon trail and pioneers looking for a better life, Elk Grove now has a six lane freeway that passes through the City with over 140,000 residents and still growing. There are few reminders of this little country town's progress and growth but if you look hard, you can find a building that represents just about every era from 1850 to the present day. The farms and ranches that brought people here in the first place are now relegated to the past but should never be forgotten as they were Elk Grove's legacy.
