


Elk Grove Historical Society Tour Preston Castle and Daffodil Hill March 25, 2010

The Elk Grove Historical Society is proud to offer a private tour of the famous Preston Castle in Ione on Thursday, March 25. The bus tour will leave the Historical Society's parking lot located at 9941 East Stockton Blvd at 9 AM and returning at 5 PM. The cost is \$45 per person. After our visit to Preston our bus will go to Sutter Creek where we will walk the street in search of a no-host lunch and spend time in the shops. Daffodil Hill, with all its glory, will be our final destination, rounding out a day of adventure and beauty.

The Preston Castle stands on a 230-acre parcel of land purchased from the lone Coal & Iron Company for \$30 per acre with 100 acres donated. The cornerstone was laid on December 23, 1890 with 2,500 people in attendance. The building is the most significant example of Romanesque Revival architecture in the Mother Lode. The land was purchased to house the Preston School of Industry, established by the State Legislature as a progressive action toward rehabilitating, rather than simply imprisoning, juvenile offenders.

Rhoads School Established 1872

RHOADS SCHOOL REPORT—Frances Fite

If you should walk through Elk Grove Park almost any morning you might see a group of young children dressed in the style of the 1890s, playing with hoops, jump ropes, or jacks, or lining up for the Flag Salute.

The Rhoads School is back in full activity following the 'winter break' of November, December, and January. Especially during March, April, and May, the school classes are scheduled almost daily to 'go to school like children of long ago'. They arrive from their home school about 9:00 a.m. and are greeted by the schoolmarm in her long skirt and high-necked blouse on the front porch of the school. They recite their Flag Salute and begin a school experience that so far they have only been studying about. The lessons have different emphases. Hygiene, Manners, and Calligraphy are there along with Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic. One of the most popular is the Spelling Bee, that pits the boys against the girls, where the last one standing is the best Class Speller.

Recess is learning new games such as Flying Dutchman and Two Deep. A big challenge is flipping a small wooden ball attached to a string into a hand-held cup. (This is one that I've never been able to master.) Lunch time brings out buckets or cloth bags holding food. There was no such thing as a plastic baggy in the 1890s.

The children learn a lot, enjoy their day, and really never forget what it was like so long ago.

Treasures from Our Past

Sarah Pierce Rhoads Daylor Grimshaw

Sarah was born 28 Jan 1830 in Edgar County, MO and crossed the plains with the Donner Party in 1846. Arriving Sutters Fort in October ahead of the ill fated Donners, the family settled at Dry Creek (Galt). William Robinson Grimshaw and Sarah (Rhoads) Daylor were married in April 1851, about six months

after Sarah's first husband, William Daylor, died of cholera. They had 12 children and raised them all in Sloughhouse. Sarah's husband died in 1881, and she remained on the homestead surrounded by a large family. In 1898 she and



her sister Catherine went to Lemoore to visit her twin brother William who passed away just one week before Sarah. Catherine brought Sarah back to Sloughhouse for burial in the family plot and gave the purse that Sarah had with her on the trip to her son

Frederick. This is the same purse, and the money in it has remained to this day and passed down three generations.
