

Inside the Museum Files

"Giuseppe Frontage"

Local Elk Grove High School and Cosumnes College history teacher, Strauss Festival founder, and popular local icon, tried to make learning fun. Here is a cute story we hope you will enjoy.

"Here is the story I told you about that I used to 'teach' to my U.S. History students and wait for them to catch on." – Arnie Zimbelman

"Giuseppe Frontage (Pronounced "Fron-Toggy") was an Italian mathematician who developed the theory of non-intersecting parallel lines. The theory stated that as long as two lines were perfectly parallel, they would never meet. He wrote and sold several books about his theory until he raised enough money to become an explorer. This was during the Age of Exploration when several European nations were establishing colonies around the world. The Italians had no colonies at the time, so Frontage decided to travel to the New World to establish Italian colonies. Unfortunately, the Spaniards and Portuguese already dominated most of the land on the eastern coast of North America. So, Frontage sailed around the tip of South America and on up to the area of present-day California but, even there, the Spaniards had already settled much of the area and Frontage was unable to establish a colony there. Because of his lack of success, Frontage was largely forgotten until centuries later when the California Department of Transportation decided to recognize him for his theory of non-intersecting parallel lines. They decided that wherever a road ran parallel to a freeway, it would be called a Frontage Road."

Thank you for being a member of the Elk Grove Historical Society and donating your valuable time and energy. We have completed many successful projects, the past few years with your help, and I wanted to showcase some of our successes. This past year, the "Summer Kitchen" was completed in November as a multi-use room. The "Foulks House" was completed with a dedication by the Native Sons of the Golden West and was ready for Christmas showing. The Blacksmith Shop and Storage facility has been open for business the last few years. 

JANUARY 17, 2022 Douglas Hsia on "Locke"



The small town of Locke, sitting alongside the Sacramento River near Walnut Grove has been a local destination for many years and is filled with Chinese history. The town has a museum, many quaint shops, and the well-known and popular "Al The Wops" restaurant. We are fortunate to



have long time Locke resident and historian Douglas Hsia speak on the Chinese culture and its history in Locke. The free, hour-long event will take place Monday evening January 17, 2022, at 6:30 at the Presbyterian Church at 8153 Elk Grove Boulevard, Suite-50, Elk Grove, 95758 (That's the NW corner of Big Horn, behind the Chevron Station). FEBRUARY 21, 2022 David Lema on "The Elk Grove Southeast Asia Story"



David Lema is a lifelong resident of Sacramento County. In 2016, he helped form the Linda Mae Mahon Lema Foundation, an Elk Grove non-profit corporation created by the friends and family of David's wife of nearly 50 years, Linda, who passed away in 2015. The mission of the LMML Foundation is to research, document, record and preserve, and present and publish the personal stories and family histories of the greater area of Elk Grove. The LMML Foundation is a member of the Elk Grove Historical Society. Tonight, David will present the 2021 LMML Foundation production titled "The Elk Grove Southeast Asia Story".

The history of the Elk Grove area is not only deep and rich but continues evolving. One significant world event which affected this history was the Vietnam War. The War was profoundly felt within the community at the time, and its cascading effects have dramatically and permanently altered the fabric and vibrancy of the area; transforming it from an agricultural-based rural community to a thriving city of diverse and vast potential. Recognizing that this era is a very distinct chapter of 'History Is Happening Here', the LMML Foundation produced a one-hour YouTube audio-chronicle which captures local people telling their stories of the era; in their own words and voices. These voices paint a history, telling the story of those who served, those who were lost, and those who lived in Southeast Asia, including how, when, and why they fled to settle in Elk Grove. Each story is different and adds an important page to this chapter of Elk Grove area history.

TOM & CINDY MAHON

Tom and Cindy Mahon are 4th generation ranchers and farmers on the historic Mahon Ranch in Elk Grove, California. The ranch is currently owned by the Mahon Family Partnership consisting of Robert Mahon, Jack Mahon, and Tom Mahon. It is the oldest family-owned business in the same location in Elk Grove. It was started by John Mahon in 1882

Tom and Cindy Mahon have been married since 1981. After ten years of working as a team together, we decided to have some children to carry on another generation. The children grew up on the ranch learning to irrigate, take care of livestock, and drive tractors. While they were in elementary school, they joined 4H and later FFA which gave them opportunities to host and support many other kids with their projects. As a bonus it gave their grandpa and grandma great pleasure to see their grandkids interact with other kids with similar interests.

When Tom and Cindy were first married, they did a lot of ranch work together. It included irrigating corn and Cindy being an exceptional siphon setter (although she could only pack 35 at a time). In those days,




we had 160 acres of corn and the water had to be changed twice a day in the Summer. Other yearly chores were branding 250-300 calves a year, processing over 1,000 yearlings per year, and fixing fences. Every year in the late Spring, sections of fence totaling 20 miles had to be put up around our allotment in the Sierras near Silver Lake. The cattle that would go up were then chosen and belled for the truck ride to the summer range in the mountains, where Bob and his wife Alice would take care of them for three months.

Living by the Cosumnes river meant that there were a lot of stray animals in our lives. Sometimes we would find young animals or birds of prey that were too young to survive on their own and we would take them in until they were old enough to take care of themselves. Of course, living on a farm meant that there were always baby calves to raise as well.

We have always been keenly aware of local history and conservation, and very much enjoy our time with the Elk Grove Historical Society.
