# Stage Stop Spotlight

Highlighting and appreciating our many volunteers

# John Frassetto

I was born and raised in Salinas and am the middle of 3 sons. My dad was Athletic Director at Salinas High School and mom taught 2nd grade. My brothers - Gene and Bob are both lawyers. People ask why I'm not and my standard answer is that I wanted to make an honest living. I graduated from CSU Fresno in 1975 (BS Zoology) and again in 1979 (BS Physical Therapy) and I worked in outpatient orthopedics in the Sacramento area for 35 years, mostly at Crowl Physical Therapy, Laguna PT and at Alves and Martinez PT until I retired. I have lived in Elk Grove since 1985. I have 1 daughter -Marisa Root, her husband Peter and my grandson Lucas live in Natomas. I have 2 dogs a 4.5-year-old Irish Setter Bailey and his 4-year-old brother Reilly. Talk about a couple of high energy dogs! I spend a lot of time with my dogs, fishing, and volunteering for the Elk Grove Historical Society. My family has had a place in Dunsmuir for the past 50 years and that is my typical vacation spot. I get up at least 5-6 times a year for few days to a week fishing the Upper Sacramento River, Lake Siskiyou and Lake McCloud, exploring the area, hiking, golfing and relaxing. I almost died nearly 8 years ago when I dropped a SUV axle on my head - with the SUV attached! Multiple skull and jaw fractures, lost my right eye (actually they found it but it was ruined), 10 days in the hospital and 4 surgeries later I was back home. Except for the eye I have pretty much recovered. This is probably the main reason I value every day and even my bad days aren't that bad. It has been really rewarding and fun working at the Historical Society. I have made a number of friends and learned a lot about the area's history. My former neighbor, John Ross tried (unsuccessfully) several times to get me to join the EGHS but then Jim Entrican got my number and asked me to help with the yard sale. While I was helping, he told me I was now Assistant Facility Manager. I told him I wasn't even a member and he said, "now you have to join." So here I am.


## **Elk Grove Park Pavilion**

1904 - 1968



Evidently, the Grange members loved to dance at their huge Grange Picnics at the park that they rented each year. In a February 17, 1965, Elk Grove Citizen, Bernice Gallup writes, "In 1904 the Park board then had an open-air dance platform and bandstand built, which was 100 feet long and 70 feet wide. The low bid was \$1,419.50 for the construction entered by E. E. Berry, who received the contract." In 1922, the board borrowed money and built a pavilion on the foundation of the dance platform. The first year the pavilion was built, enough money was cleared to pay \$1000 on the mortgage and to build on a dining room and an addition with a fireplace. On Wednesday, October 23, 1968, at 7:30 pm the pavilion burnt down. Arson was expected, was deemed unusable, and was razed. In 1976 the Rhoads School was moved to the spot from Sloughhouse and stands to this day where the Elk Grove Historical Society schedules approximately 80 living history classes a year.

The entire historical society breathed a huge sigh of relief when the huge redwood at the Rhoads School fell north instead of south after that recent storm. The tree was very healthy, but didn't have much of a root. It was its time, and we were lucky!





