Inside the Museum Files

The Start of Football in Elk Grove



When did "football" start in Elk Grove? In 1926, there is no photo or information in the Elk Grove High School yearbook about the team. The 1927 yearbook only contained photos (see photo right) with no written information. The following is from the 1928 EGHS yearbook:

"Since 1926, when the great game of football was introduced to Elk Grove High School, the football team has made rapid progress toward the goal, which is sought by all teams, that of championship of the league. When the game was introduced into the high school by Coach Harold Cunningham, nearly half of the boys in school reported for practice. The new football suits came and then work became harder and, as such is nearly always the case, half the boys cut practice and decided the game was too tough for them, so they quit."

"Practice became more strenuous, and the boys became tougher and when time the first game rolled around, every boy thought he was a football player, but his mind was suddenly changed after the Christian Brothers college team had tromped on them to the tune of 50-0 score. The next Monday morning the members of the team came to the school hobbling, limping, and otherwise, but none were discouraged with their showing, as the college team was rated high in Sacramento Valley football circles."

"The league games began and all the schools that played congratulated the team on their good showing for their first year of football. The Elk Grove team played some close games and even held their old rivals in athletics, the Galt high school, to a 0 to 0 tie and Galt had been playing football for two years."

"When the 1927 season opened, Coach Cunningham put his warriors through limbering up exercises and the boys stuck to the job. As a result, the team progressed rapidly, being able to defeat two teams (out of seven games) of the league and keep others to small scores."

The Valley Oak Press, Inc. who publishes our local newspaper is upgrading and downsizing. They publish the Elk Grove Citizen, the Laguna Citizen, the Galt Herald, the River Valley Times, and a variety of other community newspapers. Their present office property in Galt commands 19,000 sq. ft. to work. Upgrading to a private printing business allows them to downsize the old printing equipment that required upkeep, maintenance, and repairs. This allows them to move to a smaller more manageable office of around 1,000 sq. ft. A tremendous savings that they could put back into the publications. They are still figuring it out and haven't found a new facility yet. And there is interest by other publications in playing a roll. Presently, they felt there would be no noticeable changes in the publications during the transition period whenever that should take place.

One side highlight to this change is that Valley Oak Press asked the Elk Grove Historical Society if we would be willing to be keepers of the Elk Grove Citizen/Laguna newspaper archives; Three huge bookcases filled with about 170 volumes of yearly publications, sometimes requiring three volumes to hold the entire year. Fortunately, we have a climate-controlled basement, a fire protection system in place, and an electronic security system to protect the collection. We had to move a few items around, but they fit well, and we are all very excited about the acquisition.

The museum isn't continuously open weekly like the offices in Galt, but if anyone wants to view the books or do some research call the museum at (916) 685-8115 or Louis Silveira at (916) 682-1335 hm and we can make a 2-hour reservation at your convenience. We have our own files of individuals and subject matter that may be of assistance to you and an adjunct to your research. Of course, its free, and we have a copy machine at 25 cents per copy.




